
Cindy Perman called the other day and wanted some updates for her new edition of *"New York Curiosities."* The first edition was published in 2008 and she will be coming out with a new edition next year, so she wanted to make sure all the information about the Jell-O Museum was correct – and most of it was, although we have changed our web site from jellomuseum.com to jellogallery.org.

"New York Curiosities" is - - well I guess it's curious. Her topics about Western New York include the *"Sauce Beneath Their Wings"* - or the true story about the Anchor Bar in Buffalo and Dominic Bellissimo's mother Teresa who whipped up the first batch of Buffalo wings in a "secret" sauce and served them with blue cheese and celery.

And she includes the story of granola – well actually it was first called granula. (Funny, my spell check accepts granola but not granula.) This story begins with James Caleb Jackson who owned an abolitionist newspaper, but poor health forced him to retire at an early age and hoping to find a cure, visited a spa for a water cure. After a miraculous recovery he bought the spa in Dansville and renamed it "Our Home on the Hillside" and it became one of the most popular spas in the world. in California where Susan B. spent several months lobbying for women's rights and the kids were jumping rope and everyday they saw this lady walking by carrying her alligator purse, so they included it in their story to rhyme with "nurse."
