Ruth Harvie came in last Thursday and I told her that I had a special project for her to work on. She took the little red leather-covered book that lists all the people in the 1940 Book and began methodically reading through the alphabetical list. By the end of the day, she had over twenty people. On Friday, she read through the rest of the book and there were more names, some with question marks. We are still working on the list, but I thought it would be worth the effort to share what we had at this point, and see what you think.

If families wanted to be in the book, they had to pay a small fee, so just because your family lived in LeRoy in 1940, doesn't mean that their photograph is included.

As far as we can determine, Lois Thorn may be the oldest surviving person in the book. The challenge is knowing a woman's married name since they are listed with their maiden name. I've posted some of the photographs on the facebook page "LeRoy Then and Now" and have heard from some folks.

Carol Lathan Boniquisti remembers wearing her very best dress and walking down the street to have her picture taken with the Lathan family. She's also been very helpful in giving me a list of surviving Lathans. Jim Henry and his two sisters, Betty Stewart and Dorothy Papke, are still around.

Jim was thirteen when the family picture was taken. When I talked with him yesterday, he told me that what he remembers is that his dad had died (when Jim was 10) and his mother was really trying hard to make ends meet.

He stood with his bicycle, and several pictures were taken, but his father was so mad at him, he couldn't bear to open his eyes.
